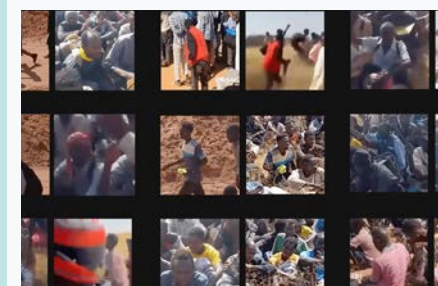

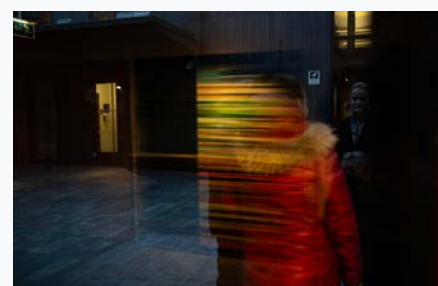

FOREWORD

There's an awkward question that investigative journalism often evades: Who is it for?

The simple answer has always been the public. But then who do we mean? Another enduring answer has been decision-makers. What unites both responses is the assumption that consequences automatically follow the publication of findings. Why do we assume that our stories will find their way to their intended audience? And that audience will act? Most of the time they won't.

The assumed formula for accountability has been to deliver a strong story which commands public attention. That's almost never been enough. And when that attention fragments, as it has everywhere, it gets even more complicated. To drive outcomes, you need an engagement strategy. But at what point does that strategy start to resemble activism? Isn't that the enemy of objectivity and neutrality needed to provide rigorous findings?

So pause.

A more honest starting point would be to admit that investigative journalism has not wanted to be specific about who it serves. But huge changes in the way people receive and process information mean there's no space left for this reluctance. The process of answering who the work is for informs where it needs to go. Thinking in advance about how findings can reach relevant audiences and how to engage those audiences does not undermine standards. In fact, there's another kind of rigour to this form of self-questioning.

The harder you work at the question, the clearer your choices become over what to investigate, how to report and who to partner with in doing that work and narrating what you find.

Most of the time there will be more than one answer. In the case of Syria's Stolen Children (see War Winners section) the answers ranged from the intimate: the affected families; to the distant: the people who gave money to an international charity that collaborated in family separation under the Assad regime.

These answers informed how we shared findings, from family WhatsApp groups and in-person meetings to Arabic podcasts and a BBC film.

So many of the answers to the challenges facing journalism — from relevance and audience to resources and innovation — begin by asking who is this for?

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BORDERS

In 2025 we exposed for the first time the brutal tactics used by the French Police to stop migrants' boats from reaching overseas territory Mayotte. Using court documents, insider testimonies and survivor accounts, we were able to confirm that at least 24 people including pregnant women and children were killed during police operations at sea.

The methods used – including creating waves, unplugging the motor, colliding with the small boats – are dangerous and not officially approved by the Police force.

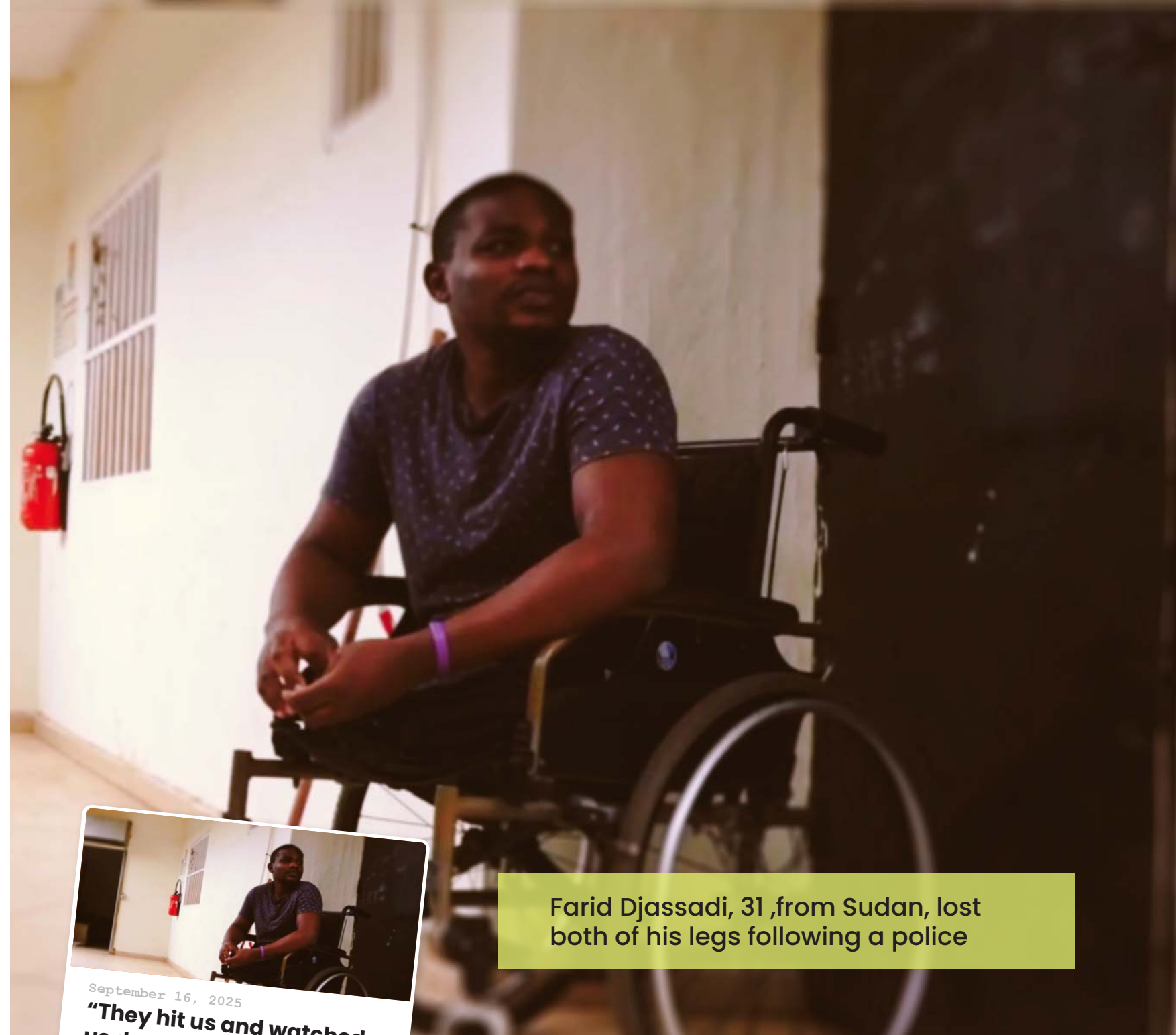
This was the first ever reporting on the subject, putting on the map a practice that was ignored for decades. It led to increased public, NGO and legal scrutiny.

FOOD SYSTEMS

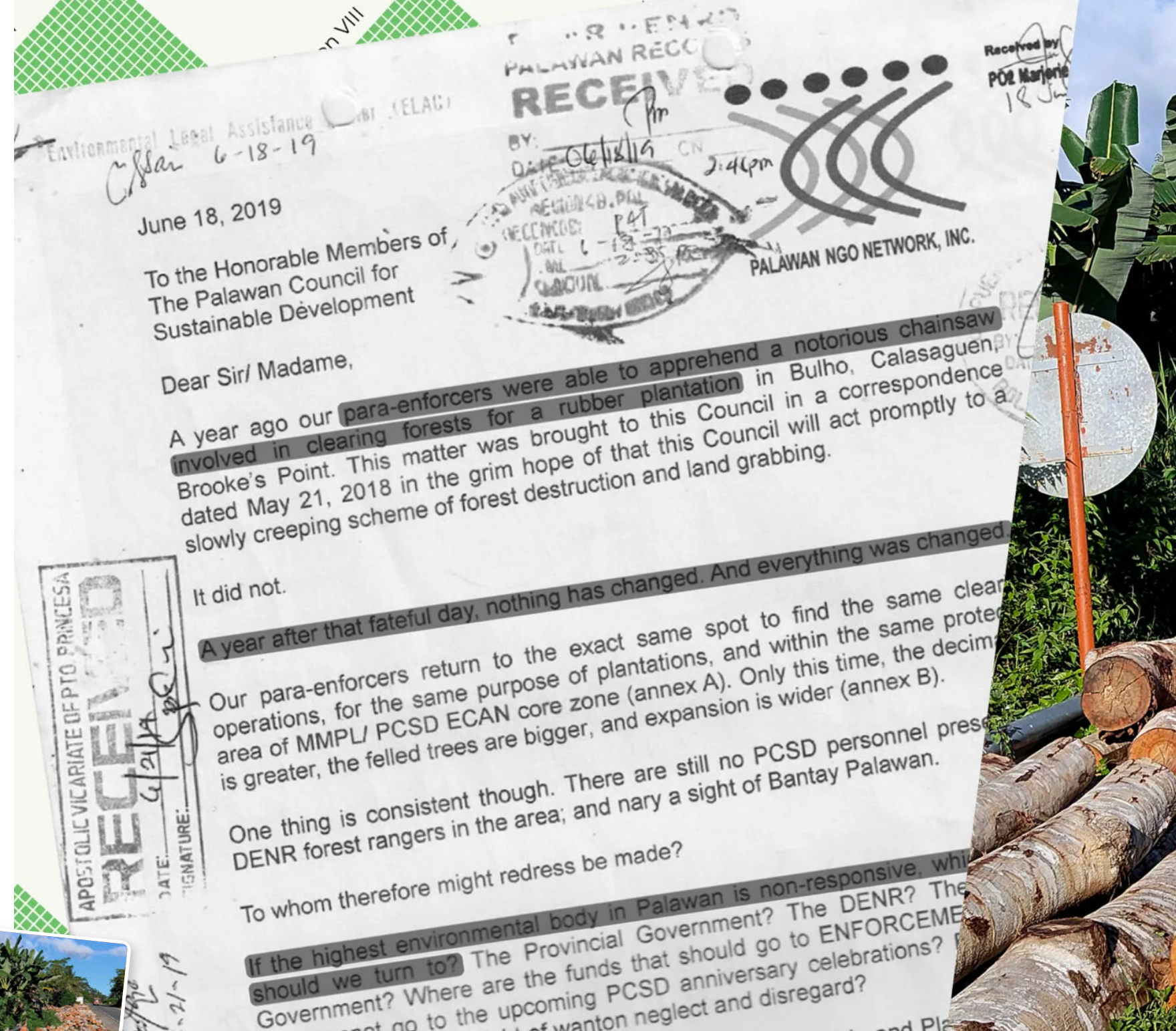
In 2025, we launched Forest Fraud, an ambitious, multi-country investigation that combined remote sensing, machine learning and persistent on-the-ground reporting, to track deforestation in protected areas across Southeast Asia, home to the world's third-largest rainforest after Brazil and Congo.

The first story exposed greenwashing behind the Philippines' much-lauded National Greening Program, designed to rehabilitate land scarred by decades of rampant logging. Instead of a win-win-win for the environment, local communities and the country, we discovered instances where forests were being cleared before or during regreening efforts and communities were forced to adopt crops and practices that do not provide long-term sustainability.

We also embarked on new projects that involve collaborating with scientists and academics to investigate structural inequalities within our food systems.

Impact Highlights

Poison PR won the One World Media award for Environmental Reporting and was **cited** in the Secretary-General's report on journalism safety and impunity to the United Nations' General Assembly.



The publication of Forest Fraud also generated much discussion and secondary-coverage within the Philippines.

SURVEILLANCE

Our Surveillance Secrets investigation, drawing together more than 70 journalists from 14 media outlets, took us deep inside the location tracking industry, exposing two decades of activities by First Wap, a previously unreported spy company. The investigation combined large-scale data analysis, confidential documents, interviews with more than a hundred victims and hidden camera footage of company executives.

As deals by the Trump White House spotlighted the activities of Larry Ellison, one of the world's richest men, we revealed how his money turned the Tony Blair Institute into a global tech sales and lobbying operation for Ellison's company. We explored how the city of Amsterdam's effort to make a "fair" AI fraud detection system ran aground, and uncovered systemic biases in Norway's criminal justice system. Combing through a leak of millions of one-time passwords sent by text message, we exposed how Google, Amazon, Meta and thousands of other companies save time and money but leave customers vulnerable.

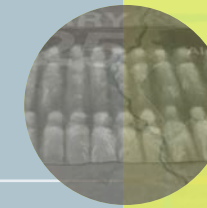
In an interim ruling in the case of a Moroccan woman seeking to visit her sick husband in the Netherlands, a judge paused her visa rejection, **citing our research on ethnic profiling** and ordering the ministry to disclose how the system works.

Citing reporting from Lighthouse and partners, the UK phone regulator banned trade in phone network access which had served as enabler to spyware and surveillance companies

Norway's court administration credits **Inequality Before the Law** with prompting courts to address systemic discrimination for the first time

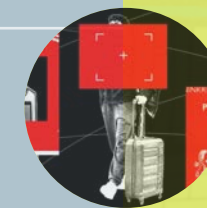

WAR WINNERS

This year we set up a War Winners Sudan team. Nearly three years into Sudan's civil war, fighting between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) has ravaged and divided the country and led to the world's most dire humanitarian crisis. More so than ever, civilians are caught in the middle of intense fighting as cities and regions change hands between the two sides. Both sides have targeted civilians with unimaginable brutality. We've documented how the RSF chased and killed thousands of civilians who were trapped in the city of El Fasher – the last stronghold of SAF in the western region Darfur – after the city fell into the hands of the militia. While the little coverage of the conflict in Sudan focused mainly on atrocities committed by the RSF, the Army wasn't doing any better. We've documented widespread ethnically motivated attacks by SAF on farming communities in Gezira State amidst a famine, combining field reporting, whistleblower accounts, remote sensing techniques and open source information.

Impact Highlights

Following our reporting on the massacres in El Fasher and Gezira State, **the UK and the European Union sanctioned two individuals** from the RSF and another two from SAF-allied militias

Saudi Arabia, a key backer of the Sudanese Army, **told the leadership of SAF to stop the killings of civilians** or they would retract their support

The SAF-allied militias who were involved in the killings of farming communities **reduced the violence after our report came out**, sources on the ground told us, and changed their hate speech into reconciliation language

SYRIA'S STOLEN CHILDREN

Syria's Stolen Children

Following the sudden collapse of a decades-long dictatorship in Syria, we worked with our longstanding Syrian investigation partners to build a cross-border investigation into one of the most painful and complex aspects of dismantling an autocratic police state: investigating the fate of the disappeared. Among them are hundreds of children who were taken from their parents and hidden in orphanages in order to coerce their families into cooperation with the regime of Bashar al-Assad. Over nine months, Syrian and international reporters from six media outlets spoke to hundreds of sources and gathered thousands of documents to build a database of hidden children. These records established systematic coordination between the intelligence services and orphanages, including one run by global charity SOS Children's Villages. Our investigation found the charity's leadership in Austria was warned by whistleblowers years earlier, but remained silent.

Impact Highlights

Families whose children were taken to orphanages joined together, after which the Syrian Interim Government agreed to meet with them and hear their demands for truth and justice

Our database **enabled** the UN's Independent Institution on Missing Persons in Syria (IIMP) to **identify a significant number of additional children affected**

UN High Commissioner for Human Rights calls findings **"extremely serious"**

The leadership of the SOS in Austria **publicly apologised** to the families and acknowledged institutional failings

Several major donors of SOS Syria decided **to withdraw funding** and as a result SOS Syria scaled down operations

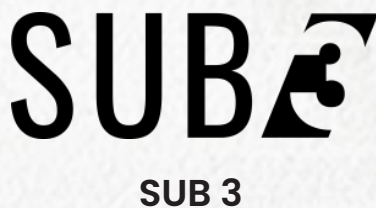

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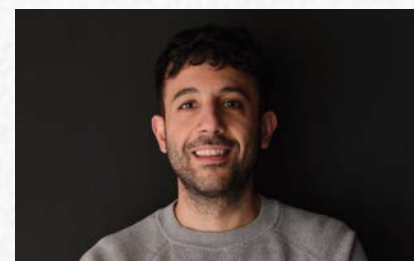
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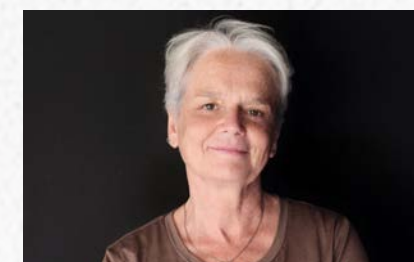
